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To whom it may concern:

We have been using the Freedom raised toilet seat on our in-patient rehabilitation center for the past year. It was chosen to replace the previously used raised seats for the following reasons:

- Increased ease of inserting and removing urinary "hats" ~~to measure urine output~~
- Increased stability (our prior seats easily became loose and wobbled)
- Increased ease of doing self-catheterization for female patients
- Thicker vinyl seat for hopefully less cracking

In the past year we have found the seats to meet these expectations. They have been receiving constant use on our twenty bed unit. We are in the process of opening a new transitional care unit and have just purchased the Freedom seats for each toilet on that twenty bed unit.

I would heartily endorse the use of these seats for disabled individuals. We use them for many reasons, not the least of which is the requirement for a raised seat for post-operative care of the total hip replacement patient.
